GOAL

Here are some fun Oscars facts!

- Only 12 women-directed films have been nominated for BEST PICTURE.
- Only ONE woman-directed film has won BEST PICTURE: Kathryn Bigelow's "Hurt Locker" in 2009.
- Ava DuVernay is the only WOC director to have a film ["Selma," 2014] nominated for BEST PICTURE.
- No films featuring WOC exclusively in leading roles have ever won BEST PICTURE. Only 3 have been nominated: "The Color Purple," "Precious," "Beasts of the Southern Wild."
- Only 4 women have ever been nominated for BEST DIRECTOR. The last was in 2009
- No WOC has ever been nominated for BEST DIRECTOR.
- The only WOC to ever win BEST ACTRESS was in 2001: Halle Berry for "Monster's Ball."
- The last WOC to be nominated for BEST ACTRESS was in 2012: Quvenzhané Wallis, for "Beasts of the Southern Wild."



New LA Times Study: Academy Membership Still 91% White, 76% Male

Nine-tenths white, three-quarters male: That's the current Academy membership, according to a new study by the LA Times.

Back in 2012, the Times found that the Academy was 94% white and 77% male, so the 2016 figures of 91% white and 76% are technically an improvement, if a statistically negligible one.

In case you need a reminder, whites make up 77% and males 49% of the U.S.

But Academy demographics are a whole different world, where African-Americans comprise just 3% of the group and Asians and Latinos 2% each.

The Times did not receive cooperation from the Academy on its study of the 6.000-odd members who vote on the Oscars, but Chervl Boone Isaccs' group did confirm that the paper's numbers align with the organization's own data.

Unsurprisingly, the branches that wield the most power in the industry are the least diverse. For example, the executive branch, whose members decide which projects to finance and which should receive awards campaigns, is 98% white. Likewise, the public relations branch, which designs and coordinates those campaigns, is 95% white.
